**Who:** Anyone giving or receiving care in Minnesota.

*We would like to include examples representative of care across the state including but not limited to: Acute care, Long term care, Public health, Pharmacy, OT/PT or Speech, Physician, Radiology, Primary Care, Clinics, Respiratory therapy, Surgery, Nursing, Critical access hospitals, Rural Care, Payer, Government, IT, Engineering, Finance*

**What:** Minnesota Safety Exemplars will share their success story of patient safety. Examples we are seeking include improve patient safety, staff safety, health equity, protecting patient rights while embodying Safety II Principles.

- Accountability: Safety is everyone's first priority.
- Collaboration: We do not compete when it comes to safety.
- Trust & Transparency: People are the solution, not the problem.
- Codesign: Better systems of care will be informed by work as done, not work as imagined, & need to be able to both scale & sustain without creating or supporting silos.
- Excellence: Learning through examining when care is done right, versus solely care gone wrong.

7. What are you most proud of through your work on this safety success initiative?
